This cohort of pupils missed usual swimming opportunities in younger years due to Covid related reasons.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	84%	Several pupils with additional need did not meet due to emotional barriers.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	84%
